

The Willits Brother's canoe that the beautiful wooden canoe that sat above the Aberdeen Museum gift shop in the Armory was a true rarity?

There were only 1000 Willits Brothers canoes hand crafted in Tacoma. An example of their work is of two canoes hanging in the Smithsonian.

With it's unique removable keel and rudder it was a great sailing canoe, used by the Aberdeen American Red Cross for their canoeing classes for many years.

Maybe you remember the little canoe house at the back of the football practice field along the Wishkah River?

Aberdeen Museum of History Status

The Museum recovery is moving well now. The site was appropriately shored for personnel safety. The contractor has finished clearing the Armory of all recoverable items. They did basic cleaning and drying on site after review by Museum & City staff.

The next phase will be further cleaning and a review by the staff and by the City Advisory Board Collections Committee. Then there will be further restoration, all the records work---the undertaking is massive. The Grays Harbor Historical Seaport has stepped forward to accommodate the larger recovered items. The City Parks & Recreation Director, Stacie Barnum, has the task of issuing and reviewing bids for a more permanent place for offices & storage until the new museum is in place.
